

You'll find out about available choices for long-term care, including services that can be provided in your own home.

## Why is Choices for Care important to me?

You and your family members may not be aware of services available to you in your home, and may think that going to a nursing home is the only choice. The consultation with a care coordinator will provide you with information about available and appropriate services that will meet your specific needs.

## Can I still decide to go to a nursing facility?

Yes, you can still go to a nursing facility if that is the service you choose. The consultation is designed to give you more information about your choices, but the final decision about the services you will receive is yours to make.

## What about the cost?

Choices for Care provides a free consultation to assist you and your

family members in learning about your options for care. Costs for actual services will vary. Depending upon your income and assets, you may be eligible for state or federal assistance to pay for your services.

be overwhelming for you and your loved ones. Through the Choices for Care Program, a trained professional can provide a helping hand at no cost to you. Care coordinators in your community will provide a free consultation that includes an assessment of your needs, a review of service options and costs, and assistance in developing your plan for care.

The Choices for Care Program gives you the opportunity to choose services that are provided by a homecare aide or personal assistant, or other services such as home-delivered meals, emergency home response, adult day service and care provided in a nursing facility. The care coordinator can help you determine which services are appropriate, available and affordable to you.

## *Purpose*

- ✓ Provide you and your family members with choices for long-term care services.
- ✓ Provide early counseling about available services.
- ✓ Provide you with information about eligibility criteria and costs for home and community-based services, as well as general information on nursing facility care.

## *Who can participate in Choices for Care?*

Anyone age 18 or over who is seeking long-term care services.

## *Who will come talk to me about my choices?*

Experienced care coordinators will meet and talk with you and your family. These professionals work at state or local agencies and have been trained by the Illinois Department on Aging and the state's rehabilitation services experts. They have experience arranging services to help people remain in their homes, and can provide general information on nursing home care.

## *What does the program involve?*

Care coordinators will ask you questions about your ability to perform certain tasks, such as cleaning, shopping, preparing meals and managing medications. Your ability to get around your home will also be discussed. This information will help the care coordinator identify your needs. You can then choose services that are appropriate and affordable.

## *When will a care coordinator come talk to me?*

If you are hospitalized and need some assistance when you are discharged, a health care professional will talk with you about your options before you leave the hospital.

Or, if you are at home, a trained professional will come visit you there.
