The Treatment & Detention Facility (TDF) in Rushville, Illinois is mandated by law to detain sexually violent offenders. The TDF population has quickly been rising since January 2010, with an increase of 379 residents, to currently 501 residents. The maximum clinical number of residents is recommended to be 482. The maximum capacity of the TDF facility is 510 residents, which is expected to be reached by July 1, 2013. The TDF has exceeded the recommended clinical number of residents, and is swiftly approaching the maximum capacity of residents. The cause of the drastic increase of residents in the past three years has been a result of a lack of judicial release of detainees. The courts, and law, have determined that the residents of TDF cannot be released into the public, yet at the same time, they cannot be incarcerated as they pose a risk and have served their time for the underlying sex offense.

The expansion of the TDF is essential to the State of Illinois. If immediate action is not taken, the State of Illinois will incur excessive costs recreating the entire management, security, and treatment staff at another location. The expansion at the current facility is more cost effective than the alternative of building or housing residents at another location. If additional capacity is not added, the Illinois Department of Human Services (DHS) will be in violation of the state law requiring DHS to house and provide treatment to persons as deemed by the courts.

Overview

Description and Specifications:

The Treatment & Detention Facility (the "TDF") in Rushville, Illinois has experienced an increase from 379 (note: this corrects attachment) to 501 residents since January 2010. The maximum clinical number of residents is recommended to be 482, and the maximum capacity of the TDF facility is 510 residents, which the facility expects to reach no later than July 1, 2013. The residents of the TDF have completed sentences for sex offenses and can therefore no longer be incarcerated, yet the residents cannot be released into the public. Accordingly, the TDF is requesting an expansion of the current facility by approximately 50 units by July 1, 2013. Hellmuth Obata & Kassabaum, Inc. ("HOK") has been selected to plan and begin the delivery of the expansion of the TDF because of its experience with detention and correctional facilities, specifically pre-cast modules and steel panel assemblies.

I, Gus Behnke being duly sworn, solemnly swear and affirm that I am Chief Fiscal Officer.

I have authorized the emergency procurement in accordance with standards as established by law and rule in fulfillment of the emergency purchase affidavit provisions of Illinois Procurement Code [30 ILCS 500/20-30] as follows.

- Involved threat to public health or public safety.
Immediate expenditure is necessary for repairs to State property to protect against further loss of or damage

The cause of the drastic increase of residents in the past three years has been a result of a lack of judicial release of detainees. The expansion of the TDF is essential to the State of Illinois. If immediate action is not taken, the State of Illinois will incur excessive costs recreating the entire management, security, and treatment staff at another location. The expansion at the current facility is more cost effective than the alternative of building or housing residents at another location. If additional capacity is not added, the Illinois Department of Human Services will be in violation of the state law requiring DHS to house and provide treatment to persons as deemed by the courts. Substantial safety risks will be increased to the staff and residents of TDF if emergency measures are not enacted.

The TDF has additional land that could be utilized for the expansion of another housing unit and would allow continued use of existing services at the facility without a disruption to the treatment of residents. TDF is requesting an expansion of the current facility, which includes 50 beds and ancillary area by July 1, 2013.

HOK has been selected to plan and begin the delivery of the expansion of the TDF because of their experience with detention and correctional facilities, specifically pre-cast modules and steel panel assemblies.

The current capacity of the facility suggests that the planning and delivery of the expansion take place more quickly than could be done through a competitive procurement.



(a) Conditions for use. In accordance with standards set by rule, a purchasing agency may make emergency procurements without competitive sealed bidding or prior notice when there exists a threat to public health or public safety, or when immediate expenditure is necessary for repairs to State property in order to protect against further loss of or damage to State property, to prevent or minimize serious disruption in critical State services that affect health, safety, or collection of substantial State revenues, or to ensure the integrity of State records; provided, however, that the term of the term of the emergency purchase shall be limited to the time reasonably needed for a competitive procurement, not to exceed 90 days. A contract may be extended beyond 90 days if the chief procurement officer determines additional time is necessary and that the contract scope and duration are limited to the emergency. Prior to the execution of the extension, the chief procurement officer must hold a public hearing and provide written justification for all emergency contracts. Members of the public may present testimony. Emergency procurements shall be made with as much competition as is practicable under the circumstances. A written description of the basis for the emergency and reasons for the selection of the particular contractor shall be included in the contract file.

(b) Notice. Notice of all emergency procurements shall be provided to the Procurement Policy Board and published in the online electronic Bulletin no later than 3 business days after the contract is awarded. Notice of intent to extend an emergency contract shall be provided to the Procurement Policy Board and published in the online electronic Bulletin at least 14 days before the public hearing. Notice shall include at least a description of the need for the emergency purchase, the contractor, and if applicable, the date, time and location of the public hearing. A copy of this notice and all documents provided at the hearing shall be included in the subsequent Procurement Bulletin. Before the next appropriate volume of the Illinois Procurement Bulletin, the purchasing agency shall publish in the Illinois Procurement Bulletin a copy of each written description and reasons and the total cost of each emergency procurement made during the previous month. When only an estimate of the total cost is known at the time of publication, the estimate shall be identified as an estimate and published. When the actual total cost is determined, it shall also be published in like manner before the 10th day of the next succeeding month.

(c) Affidavits. A chief procurement officer making a procurement under this Section shall file affidavits with the Procurement Policy Board and the Auditor General within 10 days after the procurement setting forth the amount expended, the name of the contractor involved, and the conditions and circumstances requiring the emergency procurement. When only an estimate of the cost is available within 10 days after the procurement, the actual cost shall be reported immediately after it is determined. At the end of each fiscal quarter, the Auditor General shall file with the Legislative Audit Commission and the Governor a complete listing of all emergency procurements reported during that fiscal quarter. The Legislative Audit Commission shall review the emergency procurements so reported and, in its annual reports, advise the General Assembly of procurements that appear to constitute an abuse of this Section.

(d) Quick purchases. The chief procurement officer may promulgate rules extending the circumstances by which a purchasing agency may make purchases under this Section, including but not limited to the procurement of items available at a discount for a limited period of time.
