2:15 3:15	<p>Integrating Safety with Process Improvement</p> <p>Kelly Fenton, Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Illinois Manufacturing Extension Center</p> <p><i>As companies are forced to compete with a lean operation, frequently as facilities speed up work loads, safety considerations are first to go by the wayside. This does not just potentially create new hazards, this type of continuous improvement culture can be unhealthy on an operational and financial level as well.</i></p>
3:30 4:30	<p>Electrical Safety</p> <p>Kelly Fenton, Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Illinois Manufacturing Extension Center</p> <p><i>All businesses require electricity, requiring maintenance or contract employees to be exposed to electrical hazards. An effective electrical safety program includes training, personal protective equipment, safe work practices, lockout/tagout and NFPA 70E arc flash procedures.</i></p>
