



## MANAGEMENT TEAM BIOGRAPHIES (June 2017)

### **BEVERLY (BJ) WALKER** **Acting Director**

On Friday, June 23, 2017 Governor Bruce Rauner appointed Beverly (BJ) Walker as the acting director of the Department of Children and Family Services (DCFS) effective June 26, 2017. Walker has extensive experience in children's services, human services, state and local government and education. Her leadership and management experience from more than 30 years in human services and education will be an asset to her role at DCFS. From 2004 to 2011, Walker served as commissioner for Georgia's Department of Human Resources, where she was responsible for the state's human services programs including child protection services, child care and child support. There she managed a massive state human services agency with a combined budget of \$3.4B and 20,000 staff. In 2009 she played a key role in helping the state restructure health and human services, creating three new streamlined agencies. Walker previously served as director of community operations for the Illinois Department of Human Services and was the assistant to the governor for human services reform under Governor Jim Edgar. Walker also served as deputy chief of staff for human infrastructure for the City of Chicago under Mayor Richard M. Daley and worked on research and development projects for the Chicago Public Schools and on education programming and policy with the North Central Regional Laboratory.

After her public sector service, Walker spent a year working with Franklin Covey in their Four Disciplines of Execution practice and served as a senior fellow with the Annie E. Casey Foundation. Walker recently retired from Deloitte Consulting LLP where she served for five years as a director in their public-sector children's services and human services practice. Walker earned her bachelor's degree from Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts and her master's degree from Northwestern University. She has been a long-term resident of the Austin community and is returning there from Georgia.

**LAURA ROCHE**  
**Chief of Staff**

Laura joined the senior leadership of DCFS as chief of staff in July 2016 after spending 18 months as the House legislative liaison in the Governor's Office of Legislative Affairs. In that role, she served as Governor Rauner's direct liaison to members of the Illinois House of Representatives. Additionally, Laura was the main point of contact and supervisor in the Governor's Office for legislative departments at 17 state agencies, including DCFS, DHS, HFS, DNR, EPA and ISBE. Prior to joining the Rauner administration, she was the deputy director of research and appropriations for the Illinois House Republican Staff under Leader Jim Durkin, where she worked with legislators and advocates on a wide range of policy issues. A native of Robinson, IL, Laura received a bachelor's degree from Marquette University and a master's degree from the University of Illinois-Springfield. Laura resides in Springfield.

**ELIZABETH KLING**  
**Deputy Chief of Staff**

Elizabeth was born and raised in Northern Virginia, where she graduated high school and college. After completing her juris doctorate degree at the University of Virginia, Elizabeth held several positions in DC. A move to West Virginia introduced Elizabeth to public service lawyering and she became increasingly interested in the problems facing families and children. She expects that her move to Illinois will deepen her commitment to helping not only children but also to strengthening family and community involvement in children's lives.

**ALEJANDRO MATEOS**  
**Deputy Chief of Staff**

Alejandro joins DCFS in the Director's Office and will work with the Administrative Hearing Unit in the review of cases as well as other legal matters and special projects. He has a J.D. from Stetson University College of Law and is certified for fluency in Spanish legal document review. His core strengths include compliance, quality control and review as well as legal research. He has served in many capacities including working with the Cook County State Attorney's office and he also served as Chief Financial Officer for a private company. He is a member of the Chicago Bar Association and the Illinois State Bar Association. Alejandro believes in service and making a difference.

**NEIL SKENE**  
**Senior Deputy Director for Strategy and Performance**

Neil Skene joined DCFS in April 2016 as deputy chief of staff after completing a major book, *The Florida Supreme Court: A Journey Toward Justice, 1972-1987*, to be published in mid-2017 by University Press of Florida. After graduating from law school in 1977, Neil was a reporter and editor for the *St. Petersburg Times*. For seven years (1990-97) he was president of Congressional

Quarterly Inc., a nationally respected Washington publisher of books, journals and newsletters, including *Governing* magazine, after serving three years as executive editor. Neil was a trustee of the Poynter Institute for Media Studies for 14 years, and for 10 years served on the board of directors of the Times Publishing Co. in St. Petersburg. A management consultant and writer since 1998, he served for 2008-2010 as special counsel to Secretary Bob Butterworth and successor George Sheldon at the Florida Department of Children and Families. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the nationally recognized PACE Center for Girls and chairs the National Advisory Board of the Center for Collaborative Journalism at Mercer University.

With a political science degree from Vanderbilt University and a law degree from Mercer University, Neil is a member of the Bar in Florida and Georgia. For 10 years he coached the undergraduate mock trial team at Florida State, which won the national championship in 2013. Two of his three children earned degrees from Chicago universities.

### **ROBERT T. BLACKWELL**

#### **Liaison, Office of Racial Equity Practice**

Bob re-joined DCFS in 2004 as the regional administrator for the Central Region. He had previously served the department in various central office executive functions from 1984 to 1992. As a staunch proponent of racially equitable treatment for children and families, Bob led the Central Region's service delivery for eight years. In 2012, he was tapped to oversee the Office of Racial Equity Practice as the liaison for DCFS. In this role, he is responsible for leading the department's efforts in addressing race-based disparities and disproportionality practices and outcomes experienced by children and families of color in the Illinois child welfare system.

Bob holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's degree in social work from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Bob and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and five grandchildren. Bob is a Dominican Associate and worships as a member of Abundant Faith Christian Center.

### **DIANE COTTRELL**

#### **Deputy Director, Division of Permanency**

Diane Cottrell is the acting deputy bureau chief of the Permanency Division and has been employed with Illinois state government for 34 years. She began working for DCFS in 1987 as a case manager. She worked in Quality Assurance for six years as a management operations analyst until she became a quality improvement manager in Administrative Case Review (ACR) in 1999 and worked her way up the career ladder to the associate deputy of ACR. Diane brings a wealth of knowledge and skills in relation to understanding systems, analyzing, developing and implementing policies and enhancing programs to better serve children and families. She was a vital participant in the development of the department's first self-study and provided technical

assistance to the field offices seeking accreditation. She also served as a management operations analyst for the Division of Quality Assurance. **Deputy Director, Division of Placement and Community Services**

Gerald Peter (Pete) Digre has over 40 years of experience in public child welfare and other human services, including deputy director and assistant director for operations for the Florida DCF; consulting services for more than 30 states and large counties as president of the Child Welfare Division and vice president of the Revenue Maximization Division for MAXIMUS and president of QMS: Quality Management Services; director of the Los Angeles County DCFS; director of the Philadelphia County Children and Youth Agency; and executive director of Omni Youth Services, a juvenile justice, substance abuse prevention and child welfare agency in Cook County. **DEBRA DYER**

**Deputy Director, Office of the DCFS Guardian**

Prior to her current post, Debra Dyer served for eight years as the chief deputy general counsel of DCFS. In this capacity she directed and supervised the activities of staff attorneys engaged in conducting extensive legal research, writing legal opinions and drafting legislation and department rules and procedures while assisting the general counsel in the development and implementation of legal strategies designed to minimize litigation risks. She holds a juris doctorate degree from the Chicago Kent College of Law at the Illinois Institute of Technology, a master's degree from the School of Social Service Administration at the University of Chicago and a master's degree in education and a bachelor's degree in social science from Jackson State University.

**DANIEL IBARRA FITZGERALD****Deputy Director, Office of Affirmative Action**

Daniel Ibarra Fitzgerald has had a longstanding career in social services working to ensure brighter futures for children and families. He is currently a deputy director at the Illinois Department of Children and Family Services and directs the Office of Affirmative Action. He has over 28 years of experience in child welfare through his work with Casa Central and Youth Guidance. He also serves as part-time faculty at the Northeastern Illinois University Undergraduate School of Social Work, where he has taught for over 21 years. **MATTHEW A. GRADY, III****Chief Fiscal Officer**

Matt Grady is returning to DCFS after serving almost four years with DHS as chief operating officer and a year as director of fiscal services. Matt is a highly respected, decisive leader with 30 years of experience providing fiscal stewardship of local and state government entities complemented by nine years of private industry management experience. Prior to joining the state, Matt served in various finance and accounting leadership roles for two municipalities before his appointment as finance director for the City of Evanston, Illinois. **JEREMY HARVEY****Deputy Director, Strategic Planning and Innovation**

From 2008-2015 Jeremy worked in the Office of the Cook County Public Guardian, where he coordinated efforts on representation for dually-involved youth and services available for older adolescents. Jeremy is a national public speaker on issues facing older youth in care as they transition to adulthood, a liaison to the American Academy of Pediatrics on foster care issues and a member of the Council for National Child Trauma Stress Network. Victor Jonathan has over 30 years of information technology experience encompassing application development, database management, data governance, infrastructure management, information architecture, information security and program and project management.
