




Community: East Garfield Park, Chicago

Community Overview:

Size: 1.93 sq. miles

East Garfield Park was originally a fairly affluent, predominately white community. The construction of the Dan Ryan Expressway in the mid-20th century displaced many of the residents, many of whom never returned. Concurrent migration of black individuals into the area transformed the area somewhat, as they were integrated into local community organizations. However, ongoing poor maintenance by landlords and housing disputes caused considerable conflict during the 1960s and 70s. The area has since progressively suffered from economic decline.



East Garfield Park is one of the poorest communities in Chicago, with over 23% of families falling below the poverty line. Single parents make up more than a quarter of all households, and a staggering 88.5% of all births occur to single mothers. The neighborhood is predominantly African-American (96%).


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Community: Englewood, Chicago

Community Overview:

Size: 3.07 sq. miles

Englewood began as one of the satellite neighborhoods supporting Chicago's industrial boom in the mid-19th century. Following the Great Chicago Fire in 1871, Englewood became a key center for this migration, as transit to downtown could easily be made from Englewood Station. From this point through the mid-20th century, the population of Englewood was mostly working-class European Americans, of which at least a fifth were recent immigrants.



In the early 20th century through the Great Depression, Englewood's 63rd Street was the largest shopping district in Chicago outside the Loop. As this status diminished, community leaders tried to revitalize the area by initiating an urban renewal project on the 63rd Street shopping center. Although somewhat successful in the short term, the area's economic conditions continued to decline. Englewood and its neighbor, West Englewood, are now two of Chicago's poorest communities.


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Community: Greater Grand Crossing, Chicago

Community Overview:

Size: 4.45 sq. miles

Greater Grand Crossing is so named after being the site of intersection between two railroad lines during the industrial boom of the mid-to-late-19th century. The neighborhood was and remains a predominantly residential neighborhood, with little construction since the 1930s. The area has experienced a decrease in population since the 1960s, and many of those who remain are second and third generation property holders.


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Community: North Lawndale, Chicago

Community Overview:

Size: 3.18 sq. miles

North Lawndale was one of the neighborhoods that experienced a population boom following the destruction of Chicago in the Great Fire of 1871. Mainly a home to European, and specifically Eastern European, immigrants through the mid-20th century, it experienced a population flux in correspondence to the Great Migration and racial tension during the 1950s and 60s. Rioting and decay lead to the destruction and leveling of many buildings during that time, leaving a significant number of vacant lots. Several of the major employers operating in the area closed between the 1960s and 1980s, further exasperating the economic decline. Although the area experienced some construction during the real estate boom of the 1990s, it remains one of the poorer of Chicago's neighborhoods.


Community: West Englewood, Chicago

West Englewood began as one of the satellite neighborhoods supporting Chicago’s industrial boom in the mid-19th century. Following the Great Chicago Fire in 1871, West Englewood became a key center for this migration, as transit to downtown could easily be made from Englewood Station. From this point through the mid-20th century, the population of West Englewood was mostly working-class European Americans, of which at least a fifth were recent immigrants.

West Englewood, like many of its neighboring communities, has experienced economic decline since the mid-20th century. It is now one of Chicago’s poorest neighborhoods.






Community: Township of Aurora

Community Overview:

Size: 22.58 sq. miles

In 1856, the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad located its railcar construction and repair shops in Aurora to become the town's largest employer until the 1960s. The city was a manufacturing powerhouse until 1974, when the railroad shops closed. Many other factories and industrial areas relocated or went out of business. By 1980, there were few operating industrial areas in the city, and unemployment soared to 16%. In 1993, a casino was built downtown, which helped bring the first redevelopment to the downtown area in nearly twenty years. In the late 1990s, more development began in the rural areas outside of Aurora. Subdivisions sprouted up all around the city, especially in Dupage County, causing Aurora's population to soar.



Community: Township of Cicero

Community Overview:

Size: 5.85 sq. miles

Cicero township is located to the west of downtown Chicago. Cicero's location on several rail lines influenced the Chicago & North Western Railway and the Chicago & Alton Railroad companies to establish manufacturing and repair shops there. Small communities began to develop around these and other industries, such as the Brighton Silver Smelting & Refining Company and the Brighton Cotton Mill. Western Electric established a telephone equipment manufacturing plant in Cicero in 1904 that employed more than 20,000 people, a number that dwarfed the population of Cicero at the time. Cicero's population more than quadrupled over the next 20 years, with the majority of newcomers being Eastern European immigrants. In the 1980s and 90s, a large Hispanic population began to arrive in the area, a trend that has continued through the present.



Community: Township of Joliet

Community Overview:

Size: 35.26 sq. miles

Joliet's location on the Illinois and Michigan Canal made it a prime location for the quarrying of limestone and the production of steel. These industries, and the workforce that followed them, attracted a range of other manufacturing businesses to the area. While canal construction drew Irish immigrants, the steel mill attracted thousands of southeastern Europeans. These new immigrants also found jobs on the railroad that serviced the steel mill, the Elgin, Joliet & Eastern Railway.



Joliet's economy entered a period of decline in the late 1970s and by 1983 its unemployment rate was a staggering 26%. Joliet has received some economic support due to its proximity to Chicago, allowing it to continue as an exurb for those working elsewhere. Some new development in Joliet has stimulated the local economy: millions of people visit Joliet's riverboat casinos and its drag-racing and NASCAR tracks.



Community: Township of Thornton

Community Overview:

Size: 46.98 sq. miles

Thornton is primarily known for its deposits of dolomite. It was first quarried by Gurdon Hubbard in the mid-1830s. Like much of the surrounding area, Thornton attracted a large number of Germans in its early years. Later, many Eastern Europeans arrived to work in the quarry. The Thornton Quarry is one of the largest commercial stone quarries in the world, operated by Material Service Corporation since 1938. Thornton's population has been stable for years, with its housing in great demand.


Community: Township of Waukegan

Community Overview:

Size: 21.08 sq. miles

Early settlers were initially attracted to Waukegan as a port city and shipped produce and grain from Lake and McHenry County farms to Chicago. The creation of the Illinois Parallel Railroad (now the Union Pacific Railroad) in 1855 stimulated interest in Waukegan as a manufacturing center.

Three of Waukegan's former manufacturing sites have since become Superfund sites necessitating cleanup of toxic waste. In 1988, asbestos contamination was found at one site in groundwater and air. In 1970, it was discovered that the lack of a bottom liner in the Yeoman Creek landfill had allowed contamination to enter the water and release gases that presented an explosion hazard. The city is trying to revitalize its lakefront and harbor by removing most industrial activity, except for a power plant and wastewater treatment facilities, to create residential and recreational space.

Community: City of East St. Louis

Community Overview:

Size: 14.0 sq. miles

East St. Louis is located in St. Clair County across the Mississippi River from St. Louis, Missouri. Formerly a major industrial and railroad hub, deindustrialization has contributed to East St. Louis' economic and population declines since the mid-20th century. The largest employer in the county is currently Scott Air Force Base, which is located 18 miles from the city and employs over 14,000 people. Hospitals and colleges offer additional employment in the region. East St. Louis has been attempting to revitalize its economy, but remains troubled by high unemployment and crime rates.

Community: City of Elgin

Community Overview:

Size: 25.0 sq. miles

Elgin ranks as one of the fastest growing cities in Illinois. The city's rapid growth has been accompanied by increased concerns about traffic, urban sprawl, and the city's capacity to provide services to new residents. In the 1990s, Elgin became one of the few cities in northern Illinois to host a riverboat casino. The Grand Victoria Casino initially generated controversy, but has since proven a significant source of income for the city. Drawing nearly four million people annually, as of March 2005, it is the fifth most popular tourist attraction in Illinois. The Grand Victoria Foundation, to which the casino has contributed an amount in excess of \$116 million, provides community grants to nonprofits in the city.



A significant Laotian American community also calls Elgin home.

Moline is situated on the Mississippi and Rock Rivers. As a result, it has historically been a prime location for mills and various industry. In 1848, John Deere, the inventor of the self-scouring steel plow, relocated his company from Grand Detour, Illinois, to Moline. As Deere expanded his factories, Moline grew in area and population. Other companies came to the area, including Alcoa, Caterpillar, Case, and International Harvester. Fed by this manufacturing industry, Moline continued to grow through the mid-20th century. However, no real diversification of local business occurred; when a crisis hit the agricultural industry in the 1980s, farm implement sales took a hit, and thousands of workers were laid off as factories closed or relocated. Moline has had some more recent development – the John Deere Commons, a tourist complex, has provided some support for the city’s economy.

Peoria became the first world leader for distilleries in the 1830s and 40s, marking its first major economic boom. During this time, Peoria held 22 distilleries and multiple breweries. Peoria also was one of the major bootlegging areas during the prohibition. Various manufacturing and agricultural businesses sprouted up in Peoria through the mid-20th century.

Currently, Peoria is home to the Caterpillar, Inc. world headquarters, as well as a number of other manufacturing and processing facilities. The National Center for Agricultural Utilization Research, the largest USDA research facility, is also located in Peoria.

Rockford has always been predominantly a manufacturing town. In 1876, the Rockford Union Furniture Company was formed - the first of 25 area furniture factories that were formed as cooperatives. By the first half of the 20th century Rockford was the second largest furniture manufacturing center in the United States.

The Rockford economy has suffered since the decline of the manufacturing industry in the late 1980s. Many of the family-owned companies that once inhabited Rockford were acquired by larger companies and relocated, resulting in high unemployment, housing vacancy, and crime. The city has attempted to revitalize itself with high-technology businesses and tourism generated by museums and its park system. It also economically relies on the westward growth of the Chicago metropolitan area.



Decatur has suffered from persistent job loss over the past three decades, with more than 10,000 jobs lost between 1980 and 2001. The closing of the Firestone Tire Factory in 2001 caused the further loss of 1,500 jobs.
