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Charge up!

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) is thrilled to announce a new electric vehicle (EV) infrastructure incentive program. The full details and applications are available at IllinoisEnergy.org/EV.

From DCEO:

DCEO is providing rebates toward the installation of Level II charging stations. Rebates cover 50% of installation costs (equipment and labor) up to a maximum of \$3,500 for publicly accessible stations or a maximum of \$3,000 for non-publicly accessible stations.

Eligible applicants include public commercial entities (e.g. units of local government, business, educational institutions, and non-profits) and property owners of single- or multi-unit



residential buildings.

EV charging stations must be purchased and installed prior to submitting a rebate application. Rebate applications may be submitted at any time until 4:30pm on Thursday, December 19, 2013. Completed applications will be processed on a rolling basis.

[Bills and Initiatives]

Recently, a number of environmentally-focused bills have made it through the legislature and have been signed into law by Governor Pat Quinn. These bills connect the three E's of sustainability—environment, economics and environmental justice—and have major long-term environmental implications.

SB 1869: Flood Protection

Spurred by flooding, this bill allows municipalities in Illinois to invest in sustainable stormwater management solutions such as green roofs, bioswales, tree boxes, porous pavement, native plantings and more. These techniques reduce strains on outdated stormwater management systems while contributing to community growth.

HB 1522:

Legislation specific to Peoria and DuPage Counties,

HB 1522 provides financial incentives for green stormwater management practices that mitigate flood issues. The bill also allows municipalities to experiment with stormwater user fees.

HB 2335: Local Compost

Permits Illinois Stewardship Alliance members to collect up to 25 cubic yards of food scraps to compost on site. This bill also delegates compost rules to individual municipalities, allowing for growth of community compost sites as well as business opportunities.

HB 3319: Rural Composting

Removes barriers for farm-level industrial food scrap composting. In the past, farms could only accept landscape compost, but HB 3319 allows food scrap collection as well as manure, animal bedding and crop residue.

SB 1042: Open Spaces

This bill increases liability protection for private landowners that open their land for public use in an effort to increase outdoor recreation and public space. Seven years ago, Illinois became the only state to remove protections for private landowners in public-use situations. SB 1042 reverses this.

SB 1341: Public Land Expansion

An amendment to the Open Lands Acquisition and Development Act that provides grants to distressed communities for converting abandoned lands into public-use parks. The amendment increased the amount of money available to applicants in a given year.

HB 2695: Green Fleet

An amendment to the Illinois procurement code requiring 25 percent of all vehicles purchased with state funds to run on electricity, compressed natural gas, liquid petroleum gas or liquid natural gas.


