Illinois State Board of Education Instructional Mandates Task Force

This report of the Instructional Mandates Task Force is respectfully submitted to the Governor and the Illinois General Assembly. The task force provides recommendations regarding the propriety of current instructional mandates, the imposition of future mandates, and waivers of instructional mandates. Specific recommendations are detailed in this report.

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Background

Public Act 96-1374 (formerly HB 4209) which calls for the appointment of an *Instructional Mandates Task Force* became effective on July 29, 2010. The task force is charged to explore and examine all existing instructional mandates governing the public schools of this State and shall make recommendations concerning, but not limited to, the propriety of all existing mandates, the imposition of future mandates, and waivers of instructional mandates. The task force shall ensure that its recommendations include specifics regarding funding to carry out identified responsibilities.

Members of the task force were appointed by the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, and the State Superintendent of Education according to the requirements described within the Act to fully represent the diversity of Illinois schools. Task force members participated in a series of meetings in May and June of 2011 in order to research, discuss, and compile this report.

For the purposes of this Section, "instructional mandate" means any State law that requires a school district to devote any amount of time to the instruction of or engagement by students in any subject or course.

Public Act 96-1374 requires the task force shall submit a final report of its findings and recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before July 1, 2011. The task force may submit other reports as it deems appropriate. Public Act 96-1374 further requires that until one year after the task force submits a final report to the Governor and General Assembly, there shall be a moratorium on the passage of instructional mandates for public schools.

The task force was charged with exploring and examining all instructional mandates governing the public schools of this State that currently exist and shall make recommendations concerning, but not limited to:

- the propriety of all existing mandates;
- the imposition of future mandates; and,
- waivers of instructional mandates.

Costs of Implementing Instructional Mandates

The task force completed an initial review of the instructional mandates contained within the Illinois School Code and Administrative Code as well as a review of the waiver process for School Code requirements currently in place for school districts. Discussion of mandate costs was a focal point of much of the initial review. Each district computes costs differently requiring members to carefully compare data. The specifically-named mandates contained in this report – driver education and bilingual education - are examples of underfunded mandates. Physical education, because of the facilities requirements, was also judged to be an example of an underfunded mandate in those districts lacking space or the wherewithal to pass referenda to construct necessary space. The curricular content mandates also carry with them costs to implement them in addition to providing the required instructional program based on the Illinois Learning Standards (ILS). These costs include those associated with materials and technology acquisition, staff development offerings, and instructional unit design time. The task force strongly urges the General Assembly to fully fund driver education and bilingual education. Any new mandates should be passed only with the funding needed to fully implement them in schools. The escalating costs of implementing current mandates are a burden on school districts in Illinois.

Review of Current Mandates

The task force considered instructional mandates located in both the Illinois School Code and in the Illinois Administrative Code. To assist in the review process, task force members utilized compliance monitoring probe documents compiled by the Regional Offices of Education (ROEs) and the Educational Mandates Update materials available from the Illinois Association of School Boards in order to create a comprehensive list of instructional mandates. That list of mandates is included in Appendix A.

Relevant Illinois School Code and Administrative Rules

Public schools in Illinois are required to implement academic standards, commonly referred to as the Illinois Learning Standards (105 ILS 5/2-3.64). In June 2010, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) adopted revised academic standards for English Language Arts and Mathematics as a direct result of the State's participation in the Common Core Standards project. Illinois is involved in current work on the national level to draft and adopt revised academic standards for Science and Social Science. In addition, specific instructional mandates may be found in Article 27 Courses of Study – Special Instruction; Article 10 School Boards; Article 14 Children with Disabilities; and Article 110 Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive Health Education Act.

In addition to the legislative process, instructional mandates have been added through the adoption of administrative rules. Rules currently in effect may be found at <http://www.isbe.net/rules/default.htm>.

School Code Waiver Process

The School Code currently provides a process for school districts to apply for waivers of ISBE administrative rules and statutory requirements of the School Code (105 ILCS 5). Public schools and independent authorities authorized under Section 2-3.25f of the School Code are eligible to petition the State Board of Education for approval of waivers or modifications to State Board of Education rules or modifications of School Code mandates for the following reasons:

- to meet the intent of the mandate in a more effective, efficient, or economical manner;
- to stimulate innovation; or
- to improve student performance.

In addition, eligible entities may petition the State Board of Education for General Assembly approval of waivers of School Code mandates for the following reasons only:

- to stimulate innovation, or
- to improve student performance.

Districts may request waivers for any requirements in the School Code except for specifically delineated areas. All eligible entities must first hold a public hearing to consider the request, providing for a time to take testimony about the request that is separate from the time when any other business is being conducted or testimony on other matters is being heard in addition to meeting other notice requirements. ISBE is required to submit a report to the General Assembly on March 1 and October 1 each year detailing waivers of School Code mandates required by eligible entities. The General Assembly may deny or limit a waiver requested by passing a resolution through both chambers. If a waiver is not addressed in the resolution or if the General Assembly does not act within the timeframe established by Section 2-3.25g of the School Code, or if the General Assembly does not act on a resolution at all, the waiver is deemed granted as it was requested by the eligible entity. A summary chart detailing waivers of instructional mandates is included in Appendix C.

Recommendations: Propriety of Existing Instructional Mandates

After reviewing and discussing existing instructional mandates the task force members respectfully submit recommendations in the areas of driver education, physical education, bilingual education, and curricular content mandates.

Driver Education - Behind-the-Wheel

Definition: The School Code requires any school district which maintains grades 9 through 12 to offer a driver education course which consists of a minimum of 30 clock hours of classroom instruction and a minimum of 6 clock hours of individual behind-the-wheel instruction in a dual control car on public roadways taught by a driver education instructor endorsed by the State Board of Education (105 ILCS 5/27-24). Further, administrative rules require the course be offered within a 12 month period of time (23 IAC 252.20(a)), and schools must offer both portions of the course during the school day and may offer either or both portions at other times (23 IAC 252.20(b)).

Recommendation: The task force makes the following recommendations regarding driver education:

- increase funding for schools to offer a complete driver education program;
- increase flexibility for school options to offer behind-the-wheel instruction;
- extend the time period for a student to complete the driver education course from 12 months to 18 months; and,
- encourage ISBE to explore opportunities with Central Management Services (CMS) to offer a driver education car sale/lease program, including a study of the feasibility of FlexFuel vehicles, for school districts in order to facilitate a cost-effective source of vehicles.

Rationale: We affirm the importance of students being able to access the behind-the-wheel portion of the driver education course through their respective high schools. We appreciate the General Assembly's legislation in the most recent session to allow school districts to increase fees for behind-the-wheel instruction (SB 1643) in order to keep pace with rising costs for providing it. We also appreciate the advocacy of the Secretary of State on safe driving initiatives which has resulted in a comprehensive and quality program of driving instruction for Illinois citizens.

Driver education programs require two separate components, classroom instruction and behind-the-wheel instruction. Current administrative rules require behind-the-wheel instruction be offered in at least one period during the school day. The task force recommends allowing districts to offer behind-the-wheel instruction during the school day, outside of the school day, or in any combination of during and outside the school day which best suits the needs of the school and its community. Creating a robust behind-the-wheel program held before school, after school, weekends, and summers, thus maximizing the potential for more sections of classroom instruction during the school day, would allow many schools to more efficiently and effectively instruct students in the important experiential part of the driver education program. Under this proposal, all school districts would still be required to offer behind-the-wheel and classroom driver education instruction. The change would allow the flexibility needed to meet local community needs.

It is the belief of this task force that making two revisions to the administrative rules governing the behind-the-wheel portion of driver education will expand opportunities for students to access a quality driver education program sponsored by their high schools. Public Act 95-310, championed by the Secretary of State, no longer allows the use of simulators to count towards the required hours of the behind-the-wheel portion of a student's driver education program. As a result, districts across the state are

finding it more challenging to ensure all students complete the driver education program within 12 months. The task force recommends lengthening program completion time to 18 months, which would allow additional time for students to complete driver education.

It is the hope of the task force that increased flexibility in the offering of behind-the-wheel instruction will increase the number of students completing their driver education program, both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction, in their local school districts.

The final recommendation from the task force is to encourage ISBE to explore opportunities with Central Management Services (CMS) to offer a driver education car sale/lease program, including a study of the feasibility of FlexFuel vehicles, for school districts in order to facilitate a cost-effective source of vehicles. Currently, school districts are finding it increasingly difficult to lease cars for their behind-the-wheel programs. The involvement of CMS might allow greater choice and costs savings for school districts than they are currently able to generate individually.

Cost Consideration: Recent testimony and research efforts by members of the task force and other Illinois districts were considered in determining the cost of offering a comprehensive driver education program to all students. Legislation allowing the increase in the driver's education fee that may be charged to students and the continuing budget support for driver education reimbursement is a positive step in assisting school districts to meet the costs of a quality instructional program. However, a limited research sample indicates that the costs of offering a complete driver education program may far exceed the \$50 fee school districts are currently allowed to charge students. Further information regarding the costs of driver education is available in Appendix E.

In May 2011, legislation passed by the General Assembly (SB1643) allows a school district to increase the driver education fee to an amount not to exceed \$250. If this legislation is signed by the Governor, districts will be better able to meet the costs associated with offering the program. In addition, Public Act 96-625 increased the amount of the fine for court supervision for tickets, \$9 of which is deposited into the Driver's Education Fund to support the cost of implementing driver's education. Current appropriation for driver's education in FY 11 is \$24,229,600.

While this increase in funding is appreciated, the costs of providing a driver education program exceeds the amount of state funding. In FY 05, the total cost for all districts providing driver education was \$65,661,221, which far exceeded the appropriation of \$17,929,600 for reimbursement of the costs of driver education programs. Costs for districts include salary and benefits for certified driver education instructors, insurance, vehicle maintenance, purchase or lease of dual-control cars, vehicle depreciation, and purchase of other necessary supplies and equipment. After accounting for reimbursement from the state and local funds derived from driver education fees, the net cost to districts still exceeded \$57.8 million (see Appendix F).

The task force encourages the General Assembly to continue looking at the court supervision fees and other sources of revenue that may be deposited into the Driver Education Fund to support school district driver education programs.

Physical Education

Definition: The Illinois School Code requires pupils to engage in daily physical education courses during the school day, except on block scheduled days for districts engaged in block scheduling. Such courses must be compatible with the optimum growth and developmental needs of individuals at the various age levels (105 ILCS 5/27-6). Additionally, the physical education course of study shall include a

developmentally planned and sequential curriculum focused on specified topic areas (105 ILCS 5/27-7). Administrative rules governing physical education may also be found in 23 IAC 1.420-1.440.

Recommendation: The task force makes the following recommendations regarding physical education:

- allow districts the flexibility to meet the daily physical education requirement through a combination of in-school activity and student participation in comparable verified physical activity outside the school day;
- amend the School Code to allow a local school board to excuse pupils enrolled in grades 6 through 12 from engaging in physical education courses if those pupils request to be excused for ongoing participation with a school-sponsored athletic team or other participation in locally-approved athletic activity;
- amend the School Code to allow for the expansion of the academic waivers granted to meet graduation or college entrance requirements to include students in grades 9-12; and,
- amend Section 2-3.25g of the School Code to provide greater flexibility to the limitation on the number of physical education waivers a district may be granted.

Rationale: We affirm the importance of a comprehensive, well-balanced physical education, health, and wellness program for every K-12 student. The task force feels it is imperative to integrate physical education, health education, and/or wellness through both classroom instruction and appropriate levels of physical activity. However, the task force believes students must be engaged in physical activity outside of the school day. To effectively combat the obesity epidemic in our country students must not be spending after school day, weekend, and school vacation time sitting at home watching television or playing video games. The inclusion of an outside log for physical activity encourages the involvement of students' families and caregivers, in addition to school personnel, in working towards physical fitness goals.

Current law and administrative rules require each district to develop a comprehensive physical education, health, and wellness program for its students, including daily physical education instructional time comparable to instructional time devoted to other academic areas. The task force, while recognizing the importance of daily physical activity, is also sensitive to the demands on facilities in the school day. As such, we recommend allowing schools the flexibility to allow students to meet the daily physical activity requirements through a combination of during the school day instructional activities and outside of the school day physical activities. Physical education for students with disabilities shall continue to be done in compliance with the student's Individualized Education Plan. Those activities completed outside of the school day shall be logged and verified by the parent or caregiver and provided to the school each term. ISBE may provide standard forms for documenting the activities and compliance with the verification process will be included in the school monitoring process.

Students in grades 11 and 12 currently are allowed to be excused from the daily physical education requirement if they are participating in an interscholastic athletic team. The task force recommends expanding eligibility to all students in grades 6 through 12 to waive the physical education course if they are involved in an athletic team. The physical demands and increasing lengths of training seasons for all school-sponsored sports has reduced the gap between physical fitness expectations of older and younger athletes in our schools. Students of all ages should be encouraged to participate on athletic teams and in other athletic activities in order to increase their physical fitness levels.

In addition, we believe school districts should be allowed flexibility to waive daily physical education for students in grades 9-12 who are behind in credits or who need instructional intervention coursework in order to achieve academic success and on time high school graduation. Students may be allowed to

substitute the equivalent number of hours of physical activity outside of the school day, which they would have taken during the school day, in order to enroll in the needed course. Procedures to verify the outside of school day physical activity log would mirror those proposed above.

Finally, the task force recommends the General Assembly amend Section 2-3.25g of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/2-3.25g) to remove a limitation on the number and length of waivers a district can receive for physical education (see further discussion of waivers on page 10 of this report). Public Act 95-223 amended the waiver process to place limitations on waivers for physical education and limit districts to three two-year waivers for physical education for any reason. The task force recommends that Section 3-2-3.25g of the School Code be amended to provide further flexibility to this limitation if the request for a waiver is because of inadequate facility space.

Cost Consideration: Cost considerations for physical education are based in the acquisition and maintenance of adequate facilities to offer daily physical education activity to students K-12. Costs are difficult to determine in light of the large variance in physical plant conditions and financial situations of the many Illinois school districts. In these financial times, the ability of school districts to successfully pass referenda to support building new facilities is highly unlikely. The recommendations of the task force in no way relieve Districts of the requirement to actively pursue the financial resources to alleviate the lack of facility space to offer daily physical education.

Bilingual Education

Definition: The School Code requires every school district to determine the number of limited English-speaking ability children who are in the school district, determine which language the student has primary speaking ability in and the grade level, age, or achievement level of each child (105 ILCS 5/14C-3). After the determination is made, the district is required to implement a program of instruction to meet the educational needs of that student. If there are less than 20 students of limited English proficiency in the same language classification, the district is required to implement a transitional program of instruction (TPI) which provides content area instruction in the native language as needed in order to transition the student. Attendance centers with an enrollment of 20 or more students of limited English proficiency in the same language classification must establish a transitional bilingual education (TBE) program for each language classification represented by those students (105 ILCS 5/14C-3). Further, administrative rules address additional requirements for the implementation of each TBE program (23 IAC 228.25), including new administrative rules published in May 2011.

Recommendation: The task force makes the following recommendations regarding bilingual education:

- the Illinois Advisory Council on Bilingual Education review the 20 child per attendance center minimum in Section 14C-3 of the School Code (105 ILCS 5/14C-3) and consider the potential to allow districts to administer alternative bilingual education programs instead of transitional bilingual education programs.

Rationale: We affirm the importance of providing a quality educational experience for all students.

It is the belief of this task force that the current requirement to offer a TBE program for enrollment of 20 or more students by “attendance center” is an unattainable requirement for many local school districts and often in conflict with the desires of the local community and parents for the type of programming they desire for their children. The General Assembly passed HB 3109 in May 2011, which requires the Illinois Advisory Council on Bilingual Education to review and submit a report on the following issues pertaining to bilingual education:

- if the 20 child per attendance center minimum in Section 14C-3 could be modified;

- if bilingual education requirements in state law and administrative rules may be modified to address differences between elementary and secondary schools;
- if certification requirements for bilingual education teachers should be modified; and,
- if districts should be allowed to offer alternative bilingual education programs instead of traditional transitional bilingual education programs.

The task force urges the Governor to sign HB 3109 and the Illinois Advisory Council on Bilingual Education to begin this comprehensive review. Further, the task force shall provide a copy of this report to the Council and asks that the Council inform the task force when work on these issues begins so that the task force continues to be involved.

Cost Consideration:

The cost of bilingual education differs among districts and is dependent on a number of different factors: the type of program being offered, the number of students in each program, and the number and type of languages spoken by students in the district (there are over 120 languages other than English spoken by students in bilingual programs in the state). While school districts receive some federal and state funding for bilingual education services, the costs of providing those services exceed reimbursement. State appropriations for bilingual education have decreased by 16% since FY 09 from \$75,652,000 to \$63,381,200 as passed by the General Assembly for FY 12. In addition, even before the appropriation began decreasing in FY 10, the appropriation was underfunded and reimbursement had to be prorated.

Curricular Content Mandates

Definition: In addition to a requirement that all schools instruct student in the Illinois Learning Standards (ILS), the School Code contains curricular mandates covering a broad range of topics. Many of these content mandates may be found in Article 27 Courses of Study – Special Instruction; Article 10 School Boards; Article 14 Children with Disabilities; and Article 110 Critical Health Problems and Comprehensive Health Education Act, as well as throughout the Illinois Administrative Rules. A complete list of these mandates is available in Appendix A.

Recommendation: The task force makes the following recommendations regarding content mandates:

- ISBE staff will review the task force document of existing curricular content mandates to confirm which are embedded in the ILS and communicate those embedded mandates to all school districts, Regional Offices of Education (ROEs), and Intermediate Service Centers (ISCs);
- ISBE staff will review all curricular content mandates included in new legislation and in response to the adoption of new State academic standards determine which are embedded in the ILS; and,
- school districts producing evidence of implementation of ILS for compliance monitoring visits conducted by ISBE, ROE, and/or ISC staff will have no further requirement to produce documentation for individually-listed curricular content mandates, if it has been determined the curricular content is embedded within the ILS; and,
- legislation or administrative rule may not require school districts to implement specific curriculum products or resources.

Rationale: By keeping a clear focus on the content of the ILS for all school districts, instructional time will be consistently spent on the knowledge and skills students need to be successful in meeting college and career aspirations. The intense professional development surrounding the recent Illinois adoption of the English Language Arts and Mathematics Common Core standards offers a powerful opportunity to

assist school districts in providing a clear pathway to academic success for all students. Clear expectations by grade level provide a map for teachers, families, and students to understand what they must learn.

Illinois is involved not only in the Common Core movement for English Language Arts and Mathematics, but also in the national-level work to create common standards in social science and science. As these new standards are adopted by the State Board of Education, the existing curricular content mandates may be measured against the new standards.

Cost Consideration: Determining the cost of individual curricular content mandates has proven problematic in the work of the task force. Costs are variable and are influenced by such factors as the need for professional development to prepare teachers to effectively teach the specific material, the need to purchase additional instructional supplies, texts, or materials, and/or the need to acquire additional technology or other facilities resources to fully implement a mandate. One way to defray the unidentified costs of materials development is through ISBE's website. ISBE may partner with appropriate stakeholders to review materials for placement on the website as needed. Districts could then choose to utilize these supplemental materials to implement instructional mandates.

The path the task force recommends keeps a clear focus, however, on protection of the school districts' most precious resource – time. By keeping curricular content mandates focused on the ILS, the work of teachers and students will be clearly directed to ensure students leave high school fully prepared for the next stage of their lives.

Recommendations: Imposition of Future Mandates

We want to affirm the importance of the instructional mandates previously enacted by the General Assembly. Our work over the past few weeks has led us to the conclusion many of our existing instructional mandates were put in place in response to a lack of consistent academic learning standards. Additionally, we affirm the fact that historically there was a need for the General Assembly to take action on instructional mandates, but with the adoption of new academic standards and the rapidly advancing development of resources and materials through multiple state initiatives, the focus needs to shift to how best and most appropriately implement the ILS. In the next few months, Illinois will continue to provide leadership in the development of new national science and social science standards.

Recommendation: The task force makes the following recommendations regarding the imposition of future mandates:

- instructional mandates in Illinois should focus on how to best and most appropriately implement the ILS;
- ISBE staff shall review all proposed legislation regarding instructional mandates for alignment to the ILS and make recommendations to the General Assembly regarding the level of alignment to the ILS;
- the General Assembly no longer enact individual instructional mandates; and,
- the Instructional Mandates Task Force be reconvened every three to five years to conduct an in-depth analysis of the status of instructional mandates.

Rationale: Implementation of the adopted ILS shall be the primary instructional mandate for all Illinois school districts. In cases where an advocacy or special interest group conveys concerns surrounding a curricular topic or subject not covered by the ILS, or in the case of an instructional mandate which was adopted by the General Assembly outside of the ILS, such concerns would be best addressed by the provision of free resources. These resources shall be reviewed by ISBE staff which will serve as a

clearinghouse of research-based best practices and resources for school districts. After completing the material review, ISBE would make available through the Agency website those high-quality, research-based, free educational materials for schools. Through this process, schools would have opportunities to provide consistent, quality curricular materials for subjects and topics of particular importance to the General Assembly.

Additionally, the periodic reassessment of the status of instructional mandates by the Instructional Mandates Task Force will provide an opportunity to evaluate the extent to which the recommendations of this report have been implemented. It is the hope of the task force that the focus of legislative action and the work of ISBE embrace the full implementation of the ILS. The periodic review will add an additional layer of external accountability to that commitment.

Recommendations: Waiver of Instructional Mandates

Definition: As noted in the *School Code Waiver Process* section of the report, the School Code describes a process for school districts to apply for waiver or modification of mandates and administrative rules and regulations (105 ICLS 5/2-3.25g). Each year ISBE receives and processes applications for waivers and modifications.

Public Act 095-0223 amended the conditions of the waiver or modification process to create an exception for physical education. Under the amended statute, a waiver from a physical education mandate may remain in effect for only 2 years and a physical education waiver may not be renewed more than 2 times.

Recommendation: In conjunction with the physical education recommendations noted in the section of this report regarding the propriety of existing instructional mandates, the task force members recommend the following:

- physical education waivers and modifications shall be treated as any other waiver or modification of mandates and administrative rules and regulations covered by 105 ICLS 5/2-3.25g of the School Code.

Rationale: The recommendations contained in this report seek to maintain and expand the implementation of a comprehensive physical education and health program for our students which recognizes that physical fitness and healthy lifestyle choices take place both inside and outside the school day. However, the fiscal crisis facing schools has hampered their ability to provide adequate facilities to meet existing physical education requirements.

Without adequate financial support from state or local sources, some school districts have no access to funding necessary to be in compliance with current physical education mandates and the requirements of Public Act 095-0223. The limitation of additional waivers allows no relief for districts facing financial difficulties.

Cost Consideration: The cost of meeting the daily physical education mandate is variable amongst districts based upon local revenues, levels of state funding support, ability to upgrade and/or build facilities, and locally-negotiated collective bargaining agreements.

Conclusion

The task force wishes to reiterate its opposition to the proliferation of unfunded and underfunded instructional mandates placed upon Illinois schools through the legislative and rule making process. Mandates, including driver education and physical education, serve the public good, and task force

members agree that public schools provide the best opportunity to reach all children in our diverse society. However, the persistent underfunding of these mandates, particularly in light of today's strained economic conditions, forces school personnel to choose between fulfilling the mandate or hiring instructional staff to provide services to children in areas including literacy, mathematics, and science.

Additionally, the members respectfully request the opportunity to present their findings and recommendations to the Illinois Advisory Council on Bilingual Education as it reviews the issues pertaining to bilingual education as outlined in HB 3109. In the same manner driver education and physical education mandates have increased educational costs for local schools, the requirements for implementing a fully-compliant bilingual education program result in costs far in excess of available funding.

Finally, the presence of topic and materials mandates for schools carries result in often unrecognized financial costs to districts for material acquisition, facilities upgrades, and professional staff training. Ultimately, instructional mandates enacted outside of the Illinois Learning Standards dilute the primary academic focus of Illinois schools. As such, the task force urges the General Assembly to implement the recommendations contained within this report.

The members of the Instructional Mandates Task Force wish to thank the General Assembly for the opportunity presented by Public Act 96-1374 to participate in a review of existing Illinois instructional mandates. The process was enlightening and allowed for lively debate and conversation around the fundamental purpose and intent of public education in our state. It is our hope that the recommendations contained within this report will prove valuable to the members in their work.

Welcome and Introductions

Chair LaBarre welcomed all attendees to meeting and invited all to introduce themselves. Nicole Wills and Marica Cullen, ISBE staff, were introduced as support for the team's work.

Review of Purpose and Timelines

All participants were reminded of the Task Force charge to explore and examine the propriety of instructional mandates, determine costs associated with existing mandates, and make recommendations by July 1, 2011, regarding both existing mandates and the imposition of future instructional mandates.

Discussion: Immediate discussion focused on requiring use of permissive language (“may” vs. “shall”) for instructional mandates and the previous day’s passage of a change allowing the Drivers’ Education fee to increase to \$250 per students.

Comprehensive List of Instructional Mandates

Marica Cullen explained the process and referent documents for compiling the Instructional Mandates list. ISBE staff reviewed the School Code, the IL Administrative Rules, IL Association of School Boards materials, and ROE Compliance Monitoring Tools to develop the list. Staff was directed to focus only on instructional mandates.

Discussion: Task force members explained the ROE probe document was generally used every 3 years and felt about 30% of it served a useful purpose. They felt the monitoring they had experienced contained many redundancies and was reliant on producing paper to prove compliance. Additionally, many of the instructional mandates on the list represented an important “erosion of instructional time” for students.

The requirement for offering Behind the Wheel instruction for drivers’ education was thoroughly discussed. Despite the previous day’s passage of legislation allowing the fee for such instruction to be increased to \$250, most members commented the fee was insufficient. Costs for meeting the mandate ranged from \$700 - \$1,400 per student. Several members commented the inability to use simulators,

allow students to proficiency out of required hours, recover the full costs from students, or only offer instruction outside the school day were of increasing concern to districts.

Chair LaBarre asked members to divide into small groups and review the mandates to locate those which were graduation requirements. Each group was asked to report out on its work.

Discussion: Members found repetition among the mandates and asked if ISBE could seek “clean up” legislation to combine and streamline mandates. A discussion was held on the requirement for districts to offer all electives in light of current budget conditions. Suggestions were made to have more permissive language for districts in the elective offerings they were required to provide.

Further discussion focused on the number of topic specific mandates (e.g. consumer education, health education, acts of genocide, history of women) which were already met by the Illinois Learning Standards (ILS). ISBE staff will prepare a report showing such alignment for the next meeting of the mandates covered by the ILS for the members. Members felt if the content of a proposed mandate was already covered by the ILS, it was a burden to districts and should not be allowed.

Future Meeting Dates

Further Questions

Members asked for common messaging for media queries. The committee decided the message would be the work has begun, the purpose is to review existing mandates and make recommendations, no decisions have been made, and a report will be produced by July 1, 2011.

Members asked for minutes to be taken of each meeting and for written instructions for using technology to share documents.

Next Meeting's Agenda

Chair LaBarre asked each member to consider ways to determine the costs to schools of instructional mandates, taking into consideration human resource costs, materials costs, and time costs. Each member should bring the information to the next meeting.

Welcome and Introductions

Chair LaBarre welcomed all attendees to the meeting and invited all to introduce themselves.

Chair LaBarre initiated discussion about future meeting dates. The possible dates were the week of June 6 and June 22 through 24. Nicole Wills stated she will see when the legislators are available.

Ms. LaBarre stated that Darren Reisberg would be joining the meeting for a brief discussion around 10:30 am.

Next, Chairman LaBarre asked the members if they received a copy of the minutes from the May 13, 2011 meeting. She then asked for a motion to approve the minutes. Sandra Walden moved to approve the minutes and Travis Wyatt seconded the motion. The minutes were approved by all members.

Recap of Past Meeting Discussion

Ms. LaBarre indicated she had marked up the Mandates sheet and the new version was emailed on May 26. She then had Marica Cullen recap what she has done with them since the last meeting.

The Task Force members then went through the document and numbered the pages.

Marica Cullen spoke about the PE requirement. The concern with the members was how everyday physical education was challenging, especially with block schedules and limitation of facilities. Discussion among the members was about the PE waiver process. The members were in agreement that the PE waiver process should be discussed with Darren.

Discussion on Manpower, Time and Fiscal Cost for Curricular Mandates

Chairman LaBarre stated to the members that their homework for this meeting was to think about the funding for these activities. She said it was obvious that the legislators knew that the mandates were a problem for us.

The members discussed the budgets of driver education and the transitional bilingual education program. Since driver education was a hot topic at the last meeting, the members wanted to discuss this issue with Darren. The concern with the bilingual issue was finding certified staff.

In addition, some further discussion among the members included: gifted education, summer school hours in relation to 60 hours versus 90 hours of instruction, qualifications of a library media position, half-day kindergarten and providing transportation for half-day kindergarten.

There was some discussion among the members about year-around school and possibly interviewing school staff to get their views on this issue.

Review Curricular Mandates that are not Specific Graduation Requirements

The Task Force members went through the 48 mandates and recommended how to proceed with each mandate.

Discussion of Process for Submitting the Final Report

Ms. LaBarre suggested to the Task Force to use a consensus approach to arriving at the final report recommendations. Members discussed ways to deliver the message of the report in a positive manner with an emphasis on the number of current mandates which are embedded in the Illinois Learning Standards and focusing on establishing parameters to move forward.

Questions for Darren Reisberg, ISBE Chief Legal Counsel

Darren Reisberg was available to meet briefly with the task force members. Members had specific questions on implementation of driver education, specifically-mandated hours of instruction, implementation of bilingual education programming, qualifications of library media specialists, and gifted education.

Mr. Reisberg also provided some direction for the committee to consider in drafting recommendations in the final report and requested additional time to review some of the applicable statutes and rules in answer to the task force members' questions.

Working/Draft Recommendations

Members discussed the following *possible* recommendations:

- Driver Education – Districts have more flexibility in the offering behind the wheel instruction, including, charging fees to cover all costs of offering, allowing contracting with outside providers, and allowing flexibility to not offer during the school day.

Members discussed laying out the case for the difficulties in providing behind the wheel under the current mandates, particularly emphasizing more than the fiscal aspects.

- Physical Education – Districts have more flexibility to apply for waivers, including waivers to allow for grades 7-12 or 9-12 sports and academics individual student waivers, unlimited facilities waivers in response to economic times, remediation waivers for K-5 students in the RtI model, and removal of “daily” and language of what course must contain.

Members discussed allowing recess time to be counted towards PE requirements.

- Congressional Medal of Honor – Districts do not implement mandates referencing particular instructional materials.

- Safety Education – Remove the number of hours of instruction in the mandate.

Introductions

Chair LaBarre welcomed all attendees to the meeting and invited all to introduce themselves.

Discussion of Mandates

Half-Day Kindergarten

Darren Reisberg discussed the School Code requirements for half-day kindergarten student transportation. Section 5/29-3 of the School Code lists districts that are not required to offer this transportation.

Rachel Resnick stated that if districts offer full day kindergarten, half-day kindergarten must be provided at parents' request.

Library Media Rules

New rulemaking 1.420(o) covers requirements of this program; every district must provide a library/media program. Qualifications of the individual to provide services to students are defined. The definition of library/AV services is not defined in the School Code or Rules. The provision regarding facilities is separate from qualified individual provisions. Nicole provided Library/Media rules and Board Background memo.

Bilingual Administrator Rule

Rules will be published on Friday, June 10, 2011.

Summer Bridges Program vs. High School Summer School Course

90 hours are required for the Summer Bridges grant program (specific program). 60 hours are required for a high school summer school course.

Minutes from May 27, 2011 Meeting

Chairman LaBarre asked for a motion to approve minutes from May 27, 2011 meeting. Steven Young moved to approve the minutes and Travis Wyatt seconded the motion with one correction noted.

Future Mandates

Members discussed that standards development work is an influence on future mandates. Legislative mandates should be linked to standards development. Advocacy groups, concerned about materials, could provide free resources for mandates embedded in ILS.

Waivers

Shelley Helton stated that the code allows waiver requests for most mandates. Exceptions are specifically enumerated. Only a few waiver requests were received for Instructional Mandates. The most frequent waiver requests are for 1) Driver Education: fee, specified behind-the-wheel methods (e.g. simulators); and 2) Physical Education: many reasons, General Assembly limits to a total of three, two-year waivers. Non-PE waivers are for five years.

Discussion: Task Force members discussed the General Assembly's reluctance to approve Physical Education and Driver Education waivers. The possibility of increased flexibility was discussed.

Driver Education

Representative Eddy spoke about the possibility of relaxation of Driver Education mandates. He stated that multiple advocacy groups and Jesse White are opponents to any relaxation or modification of requirements.

Discussion: Members discussed flexibility in Driver Education offerings, including offering the course at times other than during the day. This flexibility is provided in the Rules and ISBE allows this modification. Other Rule relaxations include a 12 month extension to complete and contracting for behind-the-wheel instruction.

Further discussion focused on funding for Driver Education. Nicole Wills stated that the 2012 budget is \$17-18 million, which includes an additional \$5 million. A recommendation was made that a push for funding be a consideration. Members provided real costs of districts for Driver Education and suggested members should continue to locate additional information for the final report.

Nicole Wills stated that the removal of reporting for Driver Education claims makes calculating costs difficult but some information may be available through the Annual Financial Report.

Representative Eddy recommended a focus on "paying for driver education."

At 10:30, Senator Garrett joins the Task Force meeting via conference call. Discussion returned to the schools' cost for Driver Education. Districts are absorbing over 50% of costs. The option of Driver Education during the school day vs. before/after school program was discussed. Members agreed that modifications need to be made and awareness of costs is essential.

Physical Education

Shelley Helton stated that the block schedules law allows for schools to offer non-daily Physical Education classes.

Discussion: Members discussed the facilities issue for physical education. Many schools lack facilities for offering Physical Education and will not be able to rectify this problem. Discussion also included classroom exercise programs. These programs are allowable for K-5 students if led by a teacher. Once

classes are departmentalized, a certified physical education teacher is required. Physical Education minutes must be comparable to other course minutes if school has scheduled class periods.

Task Force members discussed a recommendation for a comprehensive program, including the possibility of parents “logging” physical activities done during non-school hours. It was noted that this would require a legislative change on “daily” language.

Instructional Mandates Task Force Report

Members agreed that Driver Education cost breakouts should be included in the report. Members approved format of report presented by Marica Cullen for consideration.

Further Discussions

Gifted Education

Discussion included language and mandates moved to permissive section of document.

Bilingual Education

Discussion: Task Force members discussed the “attendance center” language. Any change of language would require a statutory change. Discussion also included concerns regarding the huge gap in cost vs. funding and the under 20 threshold requirements. Members of the Instructional Mandates Task Force will draft language to include and recommend that the Bilingual Task Force receive the information and request an invite to their meetings. Nicole Wills stated that she would send HB3109 to all members.

Code Language

Change in American Indian code language suggested by members.

Holocaust Education

Darren Reisberg provided a summary of the Holocaust Education Act meeting he attended on June 6, 2011.

Mandates

Discussion included the importance of embedding language, providing the resources for specific mandates and reminders of resources. There was a discussion about how minutes are divided over a day and how mandates eat up teaching time. Focus should be on capturing variety of ways to comply with mandates.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 11:57 a.m.

Introductions

Chair LaBarre welcomed all attendees to the meeting and invited all to introduce themselves.

Report Discussion

ISBE staff reviewed the sections of the draft report and solicited more discussion from Task Force members regarding the content and format. Another draft will be sent electronically to members on June 28 with final remarks due by noon on June 29.

Discussion of Report Content

Greater Emphasis on Cost

Task Force members requested more emphasis be placed on the costs of unfunded and *underfunded* mandates. Additional sections should be added at the beginning and conclusion of the report to make a stronger argument regarding the burden to schools.

Ongoing Review

A cyclical reconvening of the Task Force should occur in order to review new mandates enacted by the General Assembly. Members requested the review process be added as a recommendation. Members agreed instructional mandates should be tied to the adopted Illinois Learning Standards.

Driver Education

Steve Young read a prepared statement from IEA that it would not support any changes to offering both behind-the-wheel and classroom components to the high school program requirements. Members discussed how to increase flexibility without removing behind-the-wheel instruction from schools. Discussion also included how to schedule programs so more students took driver education in their high schools rather than at commercial driving schools. Members reiterated it is the underfunding of driver education which is creating the problem for schools, not the mandate to offer it. It was the consensus of the group that driver education is best offered to students by their local high schools.

Physical Education

Members discussed the wording of the draft document recommendations to clarify points. Primary concerns were how to assist schools in meeting the requirement in light of space restrictions. Additionally, members wished to explore ways to encourage more outside of school physical activity. Members did not wish for the recommendations to appear they wanted to relieve schools of continuing to seek facilities solutions. Recommendations were added to allow for academic waiver to cover grades 9-12 in order to address credit recovery or intervention instruction needs of students and to increase the grade span for athletic waiver to grades 6-12. Member discussed the need to realize daily physical education can include health and wellness activities.

Bilingual Education

Discussion included the underfunding of providing a compliant program and member concern funding would be further reduced. Members were concerned with the 20 students per attendance center requirements and what impact those guidelines would have on districts. Members reaffirmed the recommendation to provide information to the Illinois Advisory Council for Bilingual Education as it completed its work.

Curricular Content Mandates

Member affirmed the recommendation that specific instructional mandates determined by ISBE staff (and when desirable other stakeholders) to be met with the Illinois Learning Standards do NOT need individual documentation through the ROE Compliance Monitoring Process. Additionally, advocacy groups and external stakeholders with topic or subject specific concerns would be able to provide free resources for ISBE to make available through its website to schools.

Overall Message

Members agreed a strong message should be sent to stop legislative instructional mandates. Representative Eddy was asked to work with Darren Reisberg (ISBE Legal Counsel) to draft legislation to end the General Assembly's practice of enacting unfunded and underfunded instructional mandates.

Minutes from June 7, 2011 Meeting

Chairman LaBarre asked for a motion to approve minutes from June 7, 2011 meeting. Diane Robertson moved to approve the minutes and Travis Wyatt seconded the motion. Minutes were approved.

Next Steps

Chair LeBarre thanked members for their participation. ISBE staff informed members the next draft report and appendices would be available for review on June 27 or June 28. Member comments will need to be returned by June 30 at noon in order to meet the July 1 deadline.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 11:57 a.m.
